A fully equipped 'apartment' is under construction at HS North. One classroom has been converted for the purpose of teaching students how to live on their own. Students will be provided with the tools to learn to operate appliances, prepare meals, clean up after themselves, etc. The 'apartment' is fitted with kitchen appliances including a stove/oven, microwave, dishwasher, toaster and refrigerator. The washer and dryer will facilitate students learning how to do laundry. Students will also learn how to make a bed, and change the bed sheets. The Life Skills being addressed in this program are designed to foster student independence in their living environment.

The students in the **Community Based Instruction (CBI) program** at Community Middle School have been very busy learning about how to navigate the mall. Students have been learning about expected behavior at the mall, the types of stores that they can find at the mall, and how to navigate the mall using a mall directory (map).

Our CBI outings to Quakerbridge Mall have also allowed students the opportunity to practice making purchases and managing their money. Students really enjoyed being able to purchase lunch or a snack in the food court. The most exciting part was that students were able to practice skills that their middle school peers are working on!

Currently, some of the students are working on a PowerPoint to share with their parents about what kinds of stores they like to visit at the mall, how they like to get from floor to floor when they are there (escalator, elevator or stores), and what they want to learn more about. Our program is so excited about the future trips that we will be taking the students on in the community! The B. bus has allowed for students have authentic learning experiences in the community! West Windsor swimmer wins multiple medals at national Special Olympics

The West Windsor resident had to make room for four more medals after earning three golds and a bronze at the Special Olympics USA Games in Seattle, Washington, in July. "I just want to keep going for more," Lee said.

The 30-year-old has continued to develop over the years into a top-notch swimmer. The USA Games was her best performance yet at a major meet. She won the 200-meter freestyle, the 100-meter backstroke and swam the backstroke leg for the 4×50 meter medley relay team from Team New Jersey. She also picked up a bronze medal in the 100-meter freestyle.

"She was utterly incredible," said Stephanie Johnson, the head coach of Team New Jersey. "She was dominant. We knew she was good. We didn't know she'd do as well as she did. To come home with four medals with the level of competition we saw is incredible. It's difficult to get to nationals, but the way she performed was outstanding.

"In 2011, she was swimming 50 yards," said her mother, Bonnie. "Now she's doing 100s, and actually when Margo was picked to be on the team, they had two different levels of swimmers that could be picked, and she was in the higher level because she swam the

longer races.

Lee is a local product that helped Team New Jersey flourish at nationals. Overall, the six swimmers from New Jersey took home nine gold, three silver, two bronze, two fourth-place and one fifth-place award.

Students had an opportunity to go to a room that was decorated yet, dimly lit. Several activities were set up including: books for reading, crafts, coloring and the ability to listen to soft music. The alternate activity room was staffed by the Child Study Team and was very successful. Many students took advantage of the room and had some special time with Case Managers. This allowed for all of our students to be able to enjoy the holidays in a way that was sensitive to individual needs.

Pop-Up-Shop: The Millstone River Child Study Team set up a Pop-Up-Shop prior to the Thanksgiving Break. Students in need were invited to come to the "store" and "shop" for needed items. Many of our students enjoyed the shopping experience and were thrilled to go home with some gently used clothing and warm coats for the winter.

All school districts n New Jersey are required to have a SEPAG to help provide input to the Special Services Department on issues having to do with special education. In initial meetings held last year, parents identified a number of key issues. This meeting will follow up with a focus on COMMUNICATION.

Please come to this meeting to discuss your concerns regarding communication between parents and the school district regarding special education services. The SEMI program reimburses school districts for funds the district has expended providing health-related services (i.e. speech, occupational and/or physical therapy, CST evaluations, nursing services, etc.) to students who are receiving special education services and who are also eligible to receive health benefits under Medicaid. Upon initial classification, and then annually, parents will be asked by CST case managers for consent so that the district can seek reimbursement from Medicaid for any health-related services the district has provided to student who meet the SEMI criteria noted above. We must have parental consent before we can seek reimbursement from Medicaid No information will be submitted without parental consent and this program does not affect a family's insurance benefits. Parents of special education students who receive benefits under the Medicaid program are encouraged to provide consent for the district to seek this reimbursement. Please speak with your child's CST case manager for additional information or to receive additional information. Thank you!

-A Workshop for Parents/ Caregivers Supporting Young Children Newly Diagnosed with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

Wednesday, January 30, 2019 from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM EST

This workshop is geared towards parents/caregivers of <u>toddlers through elementary school-aged children</u> who have recently been diagnosed with ASD. Parents of pre-adolescent children *also* need support. By the end of elementary school, parents begin to look toward the future. They begin to think about what their children will be when they "grow-up" and worry if their children will ever "catch-up" academically and socially. All in all, the transition into adolescence can be a difficult one and a time when many families recognize the life-long planning associated with ASD.
