

Week of Respect Activities

October 2-6, 2017

■ The week of October 2nd – 6th was designated as the **Week of Respect** in accordance with the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights. School districts throughout the state are required to observe the week by providing age appropriate instruction focusing on preventing **H**arassment, Intimation or **B**ullying.

• What does bullying show about respect for others? What does it show about how much self-respect the bully has for him or herself?

Middle School Activities

Announcements were made daily with anti-bullying quotes each day along with reminders of activities.

Monday (10/2): Blue Pinky Promise

Objective: Kick off Week of Respect – raise awareness by pinky promising to take a stand against bullying.

Activity: Ms. Peters and student volunteers set up a table in the Commons during lunches where students and

staff got their pinky nails painted blue to symbolize a "pinky promise" to take a stand against bullying.

Tuesday (10/3): Wear Blue

Objective: To join in solidarity to fight against bullying.

Activity: Staff and students wore blue.

Wednesday (10/4): 2nd Floor Chalk Project

Objective: Share messages of support and hope along with the message that help is available.

Activity: Student volunteers wrote positive messages using chalk outside during recess.

Thursday (10/5): Grade Level Assemblies

Objective: Improve school climate, promote accountability and create awareness.

Activity: "If Not Me, Then Who" assemblies for each grade level.

Friday (10/6): Anti-Bullying Pledge

High School Activities

- Morning announcements: This week is the Week of Respect in New Jersey; schools everywhere are taking steps to help students feel comfortable and safe. Each day this week we will announce a quote to raise awareness about the importance of respecting yourself and others.
- Monday "Respect for ourselves guides our morals, respect for others guides our manners"
- **Tuesday** "It is not our purpose to become each other; it is to recognize each other, to learn to see the other and honor him for what he is"
- **Wednesday** "When you are content to be simply yourself and don't compare or compete, everybody will respect you"
- Thursday "Try to leave the Earth a better place than when you arrived"
- Friday "One of the most sincere forms of respect is actually listening to what another has to say"

Definition of HIB

"Any gesture, any written, verbal or physical act, or any electronic communication, whether it be a single incident or a series of incidents, that is reasonably perceived as being <u>motivated either by any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or a mental, physical or sensory [handicap] disability, or by any other distinguishing characteristic, that takes place on school property, at any school-sponsored function [or], on a school bus, or off school grounds as provided for in section 16 of P.L.2010, CHAPTER 122, that substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students"</u>

Evidence of HIB:

Factual Findings

The student knowingly engaged in racist, homophobic, or other stereotyping behavior with the specific objective of hurting, intimidating

or harassing another student The student knowingly engaged in behavior with the specific objective of hurting, intimidating, or harassing another student

Intentional (with hate speech) and designed to harass, intimidate, or bully

The student knowingly engaged in harassing, intimidating, or bullying behavior but was not aware of the potential negative impact on the victim

The student unknowingly engaged in harassing, intimidating, or bullying behavior and had no awareness of the potential negative impact on the

victim The student was "showing off" with friends or reacting to a personal (emotional) situation, and the victim was arbitrarily and impulsively

Intentional (without hate speech) and designed to

Intentional, but not designed to harass, intimidate or

targeted

The student engaged in harassing, intimidating, or bullying behavior in direct response to a real or imagined threat initiated by the other student

The student engaged in behavior that may be considered inappropriate, rude, disrespectful, or unkind, but the behavior does not violate school

HIB guidelines

The student did not engage in any behavior which meets the definition of HIB. Student has been cleared of any actionable offense.

The student was a victim of an HIB incident.

OR The student was not a victim of an HIB incident.



In-District Activities To Recognize School Violence and Vandalism Awareness Week

Elementary

- Crisis Action Team will meet to review and update all safety drill plans and procedures.
 Practice drills will take place throughout the school year. This includes lockdowns, active shooter, bomb threat, and evacuation drills.
- Developmental guidance lessons will be taught by the guidance counselor throughout the kindergarten and third grade classrooms. Morning meetings will be initiated and various topics will be included such as peacemaking skills and conflict resolution skills.
- Review ideas for School Violence Awareness Week with staff at the faculty meeting.
- A student anti-bullying/respect assembly sponsored by the PTA will be held in October.
- Guidance lessons on respect/tolerance/empathy during the month of October.
- Morning share sessions with staff members on responsive classroom techniques/strategies used in the classroom to prevent bullying and to promote community.

Counselor lessons on conflict resolution, anti-bullying, friendship and acceptance.

In-District Activities To Recognize School Violence and Vandalism Awareness Week

Upper Elementary

- Lesson ideas regarding safety will be shared with teachers.
- Teachers may sign-up for the principal, assistant principal, or guidance counselor to complete a read-a-loud in their classrooms. The staff member who visits the class will bring a story to read to the class pertaining to being aware of others and facilitate a discussion regarding its themes.
- The school's "Question of the Week" will prompt students to reflect on matters relating to being aware of how their actions impact others.
- Guidance lessons will be completed in classrooms throughout the month of October.
- Lesson ideas will be sent to teachers that build on the Respect Lessons facilitated by Counselors during "Week of Respect."
- Quotes regarding awareness and respect of others will be read over the morning announcements each day of the week.
- Daily challenges will be announced each morning urging students to be agents of change with regard to safe, kind, courteous and respectful behaviors.

In-District Activities To Recognize School Violence and Vandalism Awareness Week

Middle School

- Daily announcements that teach warning signs for potential violence.
 Bulletin board decorated with School Violence Prevention Theme.
- Challenge of the Day: #SaySomething Kind and Encouraging and make others feel included - Reach the Un-reached (make a new connection today and get to know someone you do not know)
- Challenge of the Day: Identify two trusted adults (let two adults in the building know that you trust them and can confide in them)
- Daily Quotes will be read on morning announcements. Teachers are encouraged to utilize a flex and/or class time for reflection on the quote(s).
- 6th Grade ABS will provide lessons through 6th Grade Computer Cycle in advance of SVAW to address preventing and dealing with Cyber-bullying.
- "If Not Me, Then Who" will be held to reiterate the character messages from both weeks. A Service Day will be established.
